

INFORMATION FOR FILING A DIVORCE- PRO SE

THE DISTRICT CLERK'S OFFICE DOES NOT SUPPLY THE LEGAL FORMS NECESSARY TO FILE FOR DIVORCE. WE ARE NOT ATTORNEYS AND ARE LEGALLY PROHIBITED FROM GIVING ANY LEGAL ADVICE.

If you intend to represent yourself "Pro Se" (without the assistance of an attorney), you must have knowledge to prepare and file the necessary pleadings and present your case to the Court. Some people have purchased forms through an office supply store, the library or through the Internet. You can find state approved legal forms at no cost at www.Texaslawhelp.org

Procedures for filing your own divorce

1. Bring your Original Petition and two additional copies to the District Clerk's office to be filed.
2. The filing fees are:
Divorce- spouse signs a waiver of service\$308.00
Divorce with citation in Fisher County.....\$416.00
ALL FEES ARE DUE AT THE TIME OF FILING
3. Your petition will be filed and assigned a cause number. Please have this information available when contacting our office concerning your case.
4. The District Clerk's phone number is (325) 776-2279.
5. The petition must be on file at least 60 days before the final hearing can be held.
6. You will need to schedule a hearing date by calling Mrs. Lehnert, the 1st Multi-County Court Coordinator, at (325) 235-2353. You will need to give her a copy of your Final Decree of Divorce before she will schedule your final hearing.
7. On the day of the final hearing you will need to bring a copy of your prepared Final Decree of Divorce. Once the decree is signed and filed, the clerk's office will provide both parties with a file stamped copy at no cost. A fee will be required for any additional copies. You will also need the completed vita statistics form, which can be picked up in the District Clerk's office or also can be found on the District Clerk's page at www.co.fisher.tx.us
8. Your hearing will be held in the District Courtroom, located in the Fisher County Courthouse in Roby, Texas. Be seated in the courtroom. You need to be present at the time that the docket is called by the judge. The judge cannot assist you with your divorce. You must know how to present your case in the courtroom.
